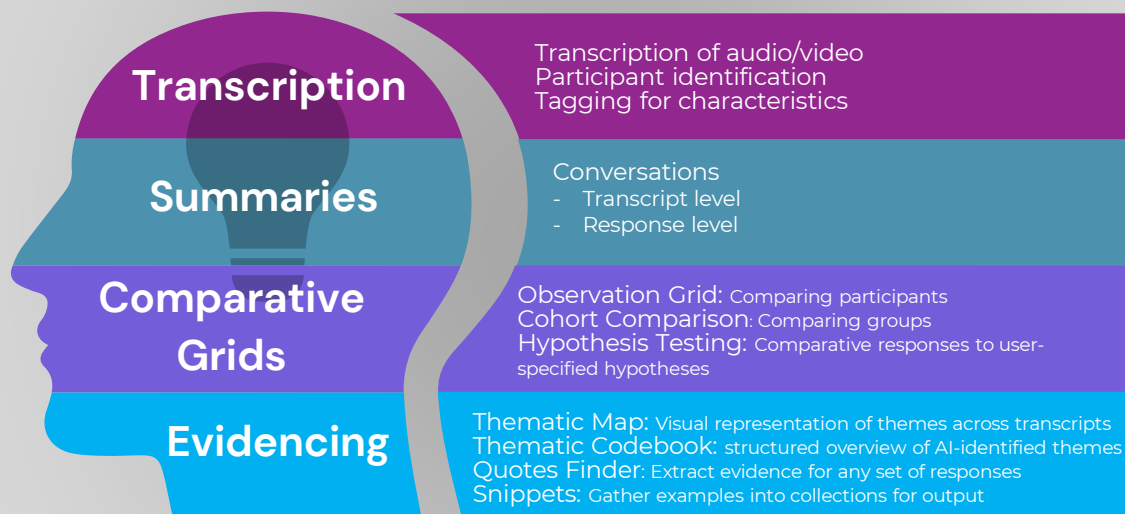

What motivates participants to start volunteering?

Annette, Grace: Volunteers are motivated by personal connections or experiences with a cause.
Ken, Fredric: Volunteering is fulfilling and provides a sense of gratification.
Grace, Fredric: A desire to contribute positively and help those in need.

Ken: Volunteers enjoy keeping busy and interacting with people.
Fredric: Christian belief in helping those in need as a motivation.

The participant found the volunteer experience wonderful and fulfilling.
Volunteer work to the participant means giving up time to help others less fortunate.
The participant describes volunteers as individuals who enjoy keeping busy, interacting with people, and being healthy.

It was extremely rewarding on the one hand and very exhausting hard work and emotional on the other hand.
Volunteers are typically motivated by personal identification with a cause, inspiration from events or experiences, and a desire to contribute positively or due to a strong social conscience.

Invited by the community, with a sense of gratification and fulfillment.
The participant also mentions the Christian belief in helping those in need.

What incentives encourage volunteers to keep volunteering?

GRACE and Fredric suggest that recognition and realistic expectations are important for encouraging volunteers.

Ken feels he has done his part and may not continue volunteering, while others suggest various incentives to keep volunteering.

The participant feels they have done their part in volunteering and may not pursue more due to age and feeling out of place.

Incentives for volunteering should be tailored to the cause to encourage volunteers to keep volunteering.

The participant suggests that recognition such as a certificate could be a nice gesture for volunteers' time and effort.
